Deaconesses/Home Missioners - Who We Are

Deaconesses and Home Missioners are laywomen and laymen who are called by God to be in a lifetime relationship in The United Methodist Church for engagement with a full-time vocation in ministries of love, justice, and service. Together we form a covenant community that is rooted in Scripture, informed by history, driven by mission, ecumenical in scope, and global in outreach. We are an order of love, justice and service. It is a lifetime commitment.

We strive to live into God's calling. The Order of Deaconesses and Home Missioners is under the umbrella of United Methodist Women (UMW). We are appointed by the Bishop and ask the church to affirm our call/ministry. We secure our own employment. The ministry we are engaged in is vast and wide. We often serve the poor, the least and the last. Our work is at the intersection of the church and the world. Deaconesses and Home Missioners are part of the Ecumenical World Diaconate.

Our discernment process gives us the opportunity to listen for the call of God on our lives and to explore God's call to vocational ministry as a Deaconess or Home Missioner of The United Methodist Church.

Currently there are 140 active Deaconesses, 12 Home Missioners and 6 missionaries, 109 retired Deaconesses, and 55 Home Missioners. In the Baltimore-Washington Conference (BWC), there are six Deaconesses: Logan Alley, Carolyn Anderson, Gertrude Dailey, Irene DeMaris, Jane Grays, and Patricia Marks. Jeffrey Murrell is the only Home Missioner.

I was consecrated by the United Methodist Church in 2014 at the UMW Assembly in Louisville, Kentucky. At the 2014 BWC Annual Conference, the Bishop appointed me to serve as Secretary of the Conference Board of Global Ministries, where I continue to work with missionaries itinerating in our area.

My ministries to the marginalized include prison ministries, the sick and elderly in care facilities, Peer Coach with the Deaconess/Home Missioner community, Business Manager with Mission U, Epworth House Committee.

Little-Known Black History Facts
Mae Jemison
 Astronaut—Physician (1956 —)

When the space shuttle *Endeavour* blasted off on its second mission, it carried the first African-American woman into space. But Mae Jemison is more than an astronaut – she's also a physician, a Peace Corps volunteer, a teacher, and founder and president of two technology companies.

Born in Decatur, Alabama, on October 17, 1956, Mae Carol Jemison moved to Chicago, Illinois at the age of 3 and considers the city her hometown. The youngest of three children born to a maintenance worker and an elementary school teacher, she had a fascination with all things science from an early age. Once, after developing an infection, she performed an extended experiment on pus. Jemison's parents supported her desire to be a scientist.

"My parents were the best scientists I knew, because they were always asking questions," Jemison said in a 2005 press release.

Jemison did well in high school and attended Stanford University on scholarship at the age of 16. There, she attained her Bachelor of Science in Chemical Engineering and a Bachelor of Arts in African and African-American studies. She went on to earn her doctorate in medicine from Cornell University in 1981.

After working as a general practitioner, Jemison served two and a half years as a volunteer in the Peace Corps, spending time in the African countries of Sierra Leone and Liberia. In addition to English, she speaks Russian, Japanese, and Swahili.

Although employed as a general practitioner again following her return to the United States, Jemison decided to pursue a childhood dream. After the historic flight of Sally Ride, the first American woman in space, Jemison applied to NASA's astronaut program, feeling that more opportunities had opened up. The explosion of the *Challenger* shuttle put a hold on applicants, but in 1987, she became one of the fifteen candidates selected out of more than 2,000 people. After a year of training, she became the first female African-American astronaut.

On September 12, 1992, Mae Jemison became the first African-American woman in space when the space shuttle *Endeavour* carried her and six other astronauts on 126 orbits around the Earth. A mission specialist, Jemison was a co-investigator of two bone cell research experiments, one of 43 investigations that were done on mission STS-47. The shuttle landed at Kennedy Space Center in Florida on September 20th. Over the course of her only off-planet voyage, Jemison logged 190 hours, 30 minutes, and 23 seconds in space.

Jemison left NASA in March 1993. She went on to teach at Dartmouth College. She also founded her own company, the Jemison Group, seeking to encourage a love of science in students and bring advanced technology around the world. She is a strong advocate for science, establishing an international science camp for high school students and working on the 100-Year Starship program.

The Food Ministry appreciates your ongoing support.

Fall Thursday Night Bible Study Will Begin September 6

On September 6, our Thursday Night Bible Study will begin its fall program. We will be studying the basics of discipleship for 12 weeks. We will be using 3 Discipleship Studies - Citizens of Hope, The Road to Amazing, and Get in the Game. All three are authored by Mary Brooke Casad and Clayton Oliphint.

The Basics Series consists of three four-week basic discipleship studies that provide a foundation for spiritual growth. With a focus on three aspects of Christian life: who we are, what we do, and how we serve, and through "holy conversation" in small groups, participants will increase their spiritual knowledge and grow as Jesus' disciples. The books that we will be using are:

- Citizens of Hope - Hope is central to our identity as Christians. Just as our bodies need food, our souls need hope, and the supreme hope is found in a relationship with Jesus Christ. How does that relationship become real to us? In this book and 4-week study, readers are guided on a formative path of understanding who God is and who they are as God's children.
- The Road to Amazing - After we invite Christ into our lives, then what? What do we do differently? How do we live out our faith? How do we move from being to doing? In this book and 4-week study, readers will learn to recognize God at work in their lives through the presence of Jesus Christ.
- Get in the Game - Living in Christ brings us joy and fulfillment. But true Christian discipleship involves more. Following the example of Jesus, we are called to serve others through Christian service. In this book and 4-week study, readers will discover the joyful service that results when faith is put into action.

This will be a great study for everyone, whether you have been a Christian for 30 plus years, less than a year or you haven't decided to commit your life to Christ yet. The wonderful thing about this study is that it will give us a chance to learn and grow together as we strive to be strong, faithful members of the body of Christ!

Faith in Action

Between being a Methodist in my youth and joining Emmanuel, I was a pledge-paying member of an Episcopal Church. At one church I attended, the Rt. Rev. Michael Marrett served as the church priest, and the abbreviated version of one of my favorite sermons went like this:

Jesus Christ visited an elderly lady one evening while she slept, and promised He would visit her the following day. She awoke all excited and spent the rest of the night cleaning. As dawn approached, she was sitting in her rocker located in the front room so she wouldn't miss His visit. Suddenly, a knock was heard on the door and the smiling, elated elderly lady ran and opened the door as wide as she could.

“Good morning to you, lass. I was wondering if you could spare some loose change for a man down on his luck,” said the older man with his ragged and tattered hat in hand.

The elderly woman was so outraged at this interruption that she said nary a word, but slammed the door in his face. She hadn't been sitting down long after this encounter when she heard a gentle knock on the door. Again she went running. Opening the door, she saw to her horror a dirty-looking young woman standing before her.

“Could you be so kind as to lend me a coat or heavy cape? It is so cold out here,” she cried as her tiny body shivered from the cold.

The elderly woman couldn't understand what was happening, and informed the woman that she was expecting someone very important and did not have any extra time to deal with the likes of her. She shut the door and went back to her rocker. Several hours went by with nothing but silence. Then she finally heard the sound of bare feet approaching her door. “This must be Him,” she said out loud. But upon opening the door, she found only a wee small child, who did not speak a word but laid his open palms out to her and with sad and thin eyes begged for some food. “I can't now,” she screamed. “Can't you see how busy I am? Now go away.” The slamming of the door was the only sound she heard as she went back to her rocker to await the Lord's coming.

But nothing happened and no one else came - until just before midnight, when she heard a gentle voice call out her name. “Is that you, Lord? Where have you been? I've waited all day and night for you,” she begged with barely a whisper.

“I was here,” she heard Him say. “I asked you for help, but you said no and sent me away. Then I came again and asked you to help me keep out the cold, but you said no again and sent me away. Finally, I came a third time and asked you for food. You didn't even bother to say anything to me; you just slammed the door in my face.”

Then there was only silence. The elderly woman sat back down, alone, in her rocker, never to hear from Him again.

Fellow parishioners, you see, we don't know when the Lord will visit us or what form He might take. However, He always keeps His promises and will visit our small church – Emmanuel – that is, if He hasn't already.

This is why I feel **Greeters at the beginning of each service are necessary**. God has given us all the responsibility of welcoming everyone, at all times, during all situations, without fail. Being a Greeter does not cost anything, takes no time for training, and only takes a few minutes to accomplish. Will you give God a few minutes of your time? If enough parishioners volunteer to be a Greeter, it would only be a few Sundays a year for each of us.

Will you please think about being a Greeter at Emmanuel? There is a sign-up sheet to the left of the first door into the Sanctuary. You can even choose which service (9:00 am or 11:15 am) to be a Greeter for, as well as the date(s).


