I joined myself for a couple of days. They helped to fix houses and aided neighbors. Through this ministry, they became Good Samaritans. I am very proud of this ministry and in particular, the participants in the ministry.

On July 16, the church had a funeral service for Alice Famodu, who was a church member. It was

beautiful and we celebrated her life and recognized her ministry on earth and celebrated her new life in heaven.

Each time I have a funeral or memorial service, I am always reminded how great it is to have brothers and sisters in Jesus Christ in the church. We share together joys, concerns, sorrows, and laughter. It makes us support, pray, and help each other. There are many communities in the world. Yet, the church is the community in which people go beyond their own interests and support and love each other. I am very proud of the church, the Christian community in which there is care, love, support, and prayer for its members.

We have another month to go through this summer. Wherever you are, I pray that you will be protected and guided by our Lord, Jesus Christ. Although we might be separated, all of you are in my prayers and spirit. I ask you to keep praying for the church and its members. Emory Grove – Methodist History in Glyndon, MD

Emory Grove is a 148-year-old Methodist Camp Meeting Ground. There are 47 100-year-old or more cottages which are privately owned. Kathy and Pat Mellott own one of them, as did Kathy's grandparents and parents. The Emory Grove Hotel, built in 1887, is no longer used for lodging, but is used for receptions, retreats, concerts, meetings and other functions. The outdoor Tabernacle was placed at Emory Grove in the 1880's and is rumored to have been an farmer's market in Hanover, Pennsylvania and moved to Emory Grove. Coming to Emory Grove is like going back in time and a walk through history of the Methodist religion in Maryland.

Our Abundant Life Singers from the Chancel Choir are the special musical guests for the Emory Grove Hymn Sing on Wednesday, August 3rd. Come support our choir and join in singing as many as 20 hymns in an hour. A group will carpool from the Emmanuel parking lot at about 5 p.m. and travel to Emory Grove which is about 45 miles away. We will have a potluck at the historic Guest House/Hotel and attend the Hymn Sing at 7:30 p.m. You should be back home around 10 p.m. Bring a dish to share. Drinks will be supplied.

Brochures of the whole summer schedule are in the Narthex. There is a Hymn Sing every Wednesday evening and a different church hosts the worship service on Sunday evenings.

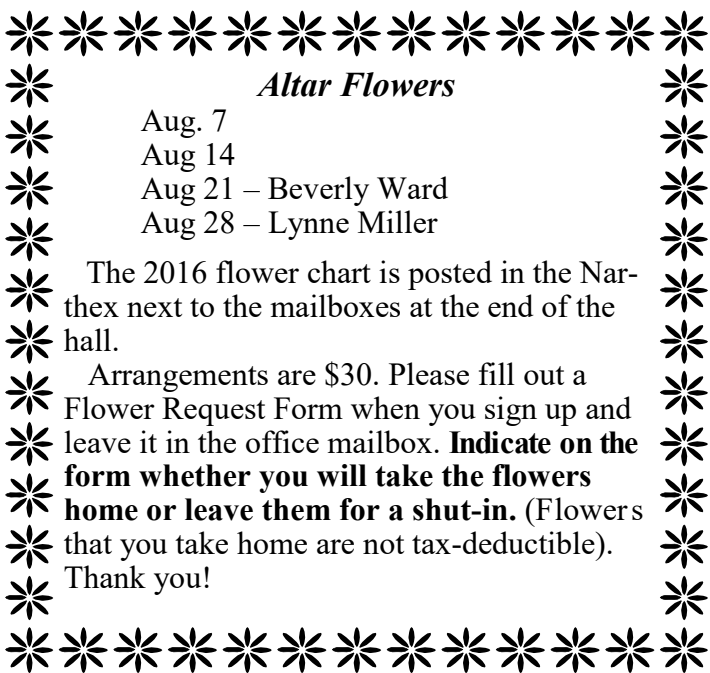

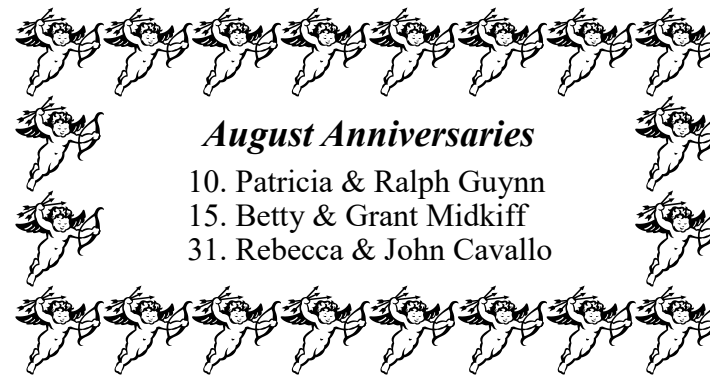
