Care Groups: Reclaiming Our Wesleyan Heritage

In his Discipleship Ministries article Small Groups Are in Our Wesleyan DNA, Steve Manskar wrote in part:

Each human being has DNA [traits] that [are] unique to that person and his or her family of origin.

Small groups are a historic trait of Wesleyan Methodism. For at least 100 years, the Methodists were known as the people who understood that Christian formation took place in small groups known as classes, bands, and select societies. It was understood that being a Methodist meant being part of a small group that "watched over one another in love" to help each other grow in holiness of heart and life.

The soul and the body make a [person]; the Spirit and discipline make a Christian.

John Wesley frequently used this adage to describe the "method" of Methodism. Small groups are the discipline of Methodist Christian formation. The General Rules provide the map; small groups provide the compass and support for the journey toward holiness of heart and life.

For the first 100 years of Methodism, every Methodist was assigned to a small group known as a "class." Each class was led by a mature lay-person who provided pastoral care and nurture. The classes met every week for at least one hour. The meetings included prayer, hymn singing, Bible reading, teaching, and accountability shaped by the General Rules. The purpose of the class meeting was to teach Methodists how to live in the world as faithful disciples of Jesus Christ.

John Wesley understood that Christianity is a social religion. Being a Christian necessarily means participating in a community that promises to watch over one another in love. Wesley knew from Scripture, tradition, reason, and experience that holiness is both a gift and a process of character formation. Such formation requires participation in relationships of love and trust in small groups. This is why one of the distinguishing features of Methodism was required small-group participation.

Small groups are also in our DNA as human beings created in the image of God. We are relational creatures because God is a community of three persons bound and united as one in love. We could say that God is the original small group. This means that God's essential character is the relationship between the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The three are united as One who lives in relationship with the cosmos. Human beings are created in the image of God (see Genesis 1:26–27). This means that we are made for relationship; because we are created in God's image, we have the capacity and need to give and receive love. We become fully the persons God created us to be only through a matrix of relationships God provides by grace. In other words, loving relationships are as important to our life and health as food, water, and air.

The relationships God provides through small groups are as essential to Christian formation as worship, Scripture, and prayer.

In keeping with our historical DNA as Wesleyans (i.e., Methodist), we shall move forward in spiritual formation through the formation of small groups, which will be referred to as "Care Groups."

To begin, Care Groups will be composed of persons who were born in the same month, and each Care Group will select a group leader to connect with the pastor on matters from the group. Each group will agree to a written covenant to pray for one another, share joys and concerns, keep matters private, and provide encouragement and support (as the group as a whole agrees).

As a standard practice, each Care Group will be celebrated during the monthly potluck in the month of its members' birthdays to receive special birthday recognition. Also, do not be surprised when the birthday babies receive special treats!

Pastor King**Update from the Trustees**

Back in October, we informed you that we have a renter in our parsonage. We are currently in the process of updating and renewing our rental license with Prince George's County. At this time, we have a temporary license that is valid through February.

As part of the licensing process, the parsonage was inspected. As a result of that inspection, several repairs were required. This work included repairing windows and doors, addressing issues in the garage area, patching a few holes in the roof, removing rotted trees that posed a safety risk, and unclogging the kitchen sink and garbage disposal.

After this work was completed, the heating system unexpectedly failed. We are currently working to have the heating system replaced. Once that is completed, we will schedule a follow-up inspection so we can obtain our permanent rental license.

We recognize that this seems like a lot of work, but the property had been unoccupied for an extended period of time. We are committed to caring for it and bringing it into the best possible condition. Please continue to keep us in your prayers as this work is completed.



From "Women of Achievement

NANCY E. THRUSH
Registered Nurse and Health Advocate, 1934-

ederal Women's Program for her "tireless efforts to improve the physical and mental health conditions and quality of life of the Beltsville area work force." She was inducted into the Prince George's County Women's Hall of Fame in 1991. ♣

Iowe Nancy my life," wrote L. R. Batra, a science advisor at the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC), about Nancy in a letter nominating her for the 1991 Prince George's County Women's Hall of Fame.

"She was astute enough to detect my pallor beneath my natural Indian tan as well as heart attack symptoms even though I did not have the classic pre-angina pains associated with an oncoming heart attack," he explained. "If I had not been urged to go to the hospital by Nancy, I would have returned to my office and died there. Later, while still in the hospital, I had triple coronary bypass surgery."

Mr. Batra's near-death experience is illustrative of the profound impact which Nancy's dedication

to personal health and physical fitness has had on the lives of countless individuals. A registered nurse and occupational health professional, she started working at BARC in 1962, where she initiated two trailblazing programs long before the issues they addressed became topics for public debate.

Nancy pioneered the idea of a workplace child care center in 1968. The first of its kind for USDA employees, it provided a safe and supportive environment for the pre-school children of working parents and served as a model for other federal child care programs around the country. She also pioneered employee health maintenance programs at BARC. For example, she established workplace programs on drug awareness, stress, diabetes, mammography and breast self-examination. She also initiated annual smoke-outs.

In 1969, long before the physical fitness craze had become a national phenomenon,

Nancy was recognized for successfully organizing the Slim Downers, the first USDA weight reduction group. As a result of her efforts, a health and fitness center was established at BARC in 1981.

Like the child care center she spearheaded earlier, Nancy's fitness initiatives put the USDA in the forefront of government fitness programs.

Nancy's contributions to the health and well-being of others extend well beyond the confines of BARC. She has been involved in a variety of community outreach efforts, including special fund-raising and food drives for needy families. She has received numerous honors and certificates of appreciation from employee groups and other organizations, many of them noting her "outstanding leadership and dedicated service."

In addition to these volunteer services, Nancy has devoted innumerable hours to her four children's activities. She has participated in the PTA, Girl Scouts, Majorettes and the Boys and Girls Clubs.

Nancy was cited by the State of Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene in 1979 for twenty-five years of distinguished volunteer service. The American Red Cross recognized her in 1987 for conducting over fifteen hundred volunteer hours of CPR and first aid classes and setting up blood donor programs. In 1990, she was honored by the Beltsville Area Fed-

Mix together in glass or pitcher:


1 part mango nectar or puree


