Greetings!

June was a busy month. From June 1 to June 4, I participated in the annual conference. It was held at the Marriott Wardman Park Hotel in Washington, DC. The conference's main theme was "You Have the Power," which means God

empowers us with holy power. There were sessions for worship, official business, praise, the budget, fundraising for African University, Bible study, recognition of retiring pastors, farewell worship for Bishop Marcus Matthews, and so on.

There was an historic moment during the annual conference. It took place when the clergy voted on whether to commission a clergy candidate as a deacon. The candidate, Ms. T.C. Morrow, is married to a woman. Ms. Morrow passed the ordination exams and needed to receive two-thirds of the votes at the annual conference to become a deacon. Before the voting began, there was lively discussion about whether Ms. Morrow is qualified to be commissioned a deacon. Some who supported her candidacy reminded the delegates that God is love, and we need to love those who are different. Others brought up the point that the Bible does not support homosexuality.

After a long discussion, voting took place. If my figures are correct, approximately 60% of the clergy voted for her, while 30% didn't. Therefore, she could not be commissioned. After the voting, there was a time for clergy to bring her back and pray with her. While observing this historic split in the conference resulting from different viewpoints about homosexuality, I was very concerned about what will be the future of the United Methodist Church. I am sure that the issue of homosexuality will come up again, not only at the next annual conference of the Baltimore-Washington Conference, but at other annual conferences in the United States of America. The only thing I could do was pray for a peaceful resolution and for harmony among United Methodist Christians.

There were many other activities at the annual conference. I am sure that United Methodist Connection

will cover the other issues, as well as the controversial issue of homosexuality, in detail. Please read the newspaper and you will see what else happened in the annual conference.

In June, I really enjoyed working with the two confirmands, Olamide and Tia. At Lovely Lane UMC in Baltimore, they learned about the origin and history of American Methodism. They participated in the food ministry. For cross-cultural awareness, they went to a Korean restaurant in Ellicott City and attended a gospel song concert at a Korean UMC in Towson, MD. They also attended the church seminar on discipleship and church growth. Finally, they were confirmed on June 26, 2016. It was a very joyful and wonderful moment, because they were my first confirmands at Emmanuel UMC in Beltsville.

While at the annual conference, I happened to run into a retiring pastor. I said to her, "Congratulations!" I really meant it for her. I can only imagine how faithfully she has served the Lord, her churches, and the congregations. That pastor's retirement represents many years of long and faithful service. There may have been many tears, pain, struggle, joy, and laughter along her faith journey. It was a good reminder that I also need to faithfully serve the Lord and the church with all my strength and love. The retiring pastor could be a good role model for all Christians, encouraging us to do our best for the church – the body of Christ. We are called to serve the Lord throughout our lifetime. So while we may retire from our career, there is no retirement from serving God.

Now it is summertime, when people take a vacation and enjoy themselves. Personally, I took a family vacation from June 20 to 24. My family and I relaxed and enjoyed our time together. I hope that you will enjoy your summer and will come back relaxed, refreshed and revitalized to keep serving the Lord.

Sarah and I want to thank Emmanuel for the warm and generous reception, gifts, and send-off on June 12th. We appreciate your love and spirit of celebration. It certainly was difficult to say farewell to our church home of the last 10 years. Emmanuel was where we were baptized, married, and the seeds of children's faith planted. You all reminded us of how much we have grown in the good soil at our church. Emmanuel has left its imprint on us at least as much as we have on it.

I come from a family of gardeners. In fact, growing up some of my favorite memories involve food from the family garden. Dear Friends.

April 28 through May 2, 2016, I had the opportunity to be one of 38 members of a **Kairos Prison Ministry International** (KPMI) **volunteers in mission team**. At our

3½-day retreat, we ministered to the women inside Maryland Correctional Institution for Women (MCI-W) in Jessup. It was an amazing spiritual experience. 'God's Love,' 'Forgiveness,' 'Choices,' 'You are not alone,' and 'Friendship with God' are

examples of some of the talks discussed during our stay inside.

In preparation for our weekend, the team members asked friends, family, and supporters to sign our prayer vigil and pray for the team, the incarcerated and the insti-

tution. We posted the prayer log online to ensure that every time slot was filled with prayer during our stay inside. We transferred first names only to a scroll, and then wrote the first names on strips of colored paper to make a prayer chain. Once completed, the prayer chain was over 10 feet long! When we carried it into our sacred space inside the institution, the women were overcome with emotion. They were amazed that so many people around the globe were praying for them. For most of them, it was their first encounter with unconditional love.

The final day of the retreat, every woman received a Kairos cross and a gift bag which included love letters from the team and a bible, as well as placemats made by children, youth, church groups and other volunteers.

Outside guests were invited to attend the Sunday afternoon closing ceremony, and they experienced the personal testimonies and witnessed the transformation of the residents.

KPMI is one ministry which has three programs. The <u>Kairos Inside</u> program, which operates in both male and female institutions, brings positive and negative leaders together for a 3 ½-day weekend based on a series of talks, discussions, chapel meditations and music led by a same-gender team of volunteers. The Kairos Inside goal is to build a continuing Christian community inside the institution through Prayer and Share accountability groups and monthly Reunions organized by Kairos graduates and volunteers. The purpose of <u>Kairos Outside</u> is to demonstrate Christian support for women whose relatives/friends are, or have been, incarcerated. Spouses, parents and relatives of the incarcerated often "do time" right along with their loved ones. <u>Kairos Torch</u> is a mentoring program for incarcerated offenders age 25 and under. The weekend is a combined effort to introduce young men and women to Christian concepts as a means of making better choices for their lives. The initial weekend is followed with an established six-month, one-to-one weekly mentoring program that encourages the youth to remove their masks and see themselves as God sees them.


United Methodist Women

Deaf Woman Ordained as a United Methodist Elder Submitted by Roy White



Carrie and I journeyed via Metro to the Marriott Wardman Park Hotel in DC on June 4, 2016 to witness our Deaf friend, Lisa Jordan, being ordained an elder. Lisa was a part of our Deaf Mission team in Kenya back in 2013. She is the second Deaf woman to have been ordained an elder in the history of the United Methodist Church. Before Lisa became a licensed preacher at Mt. Bethel UMC in Smithsburg, MD in 2008, she was a high school music teacher. As her hearing loss became worse, Lisa had to leave the teaching profession. Then she became a chaplain at Gallaudet University for a few years before becoming a pastor at Magothy United Methodist Church of the Deaf in Pasadena, MD. She also was involved with Deaf Shalom Zone at Christ United Methodist Church of the Deaf in Baltimore.

Lisa recently returned to the Baltimore-Washington Conference from her pastorate at Bread of Life Deaf Church in Minneapolis, MN, which is affiliated with the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America. Having had cochlear implants in both ears, Lisa was able to be trained to become a certified deaf interpreter. She has worked part-time as an interpreter for ZVRS (Video Relay Service).

Rev. Lisa Jordan's new pastoral appointment is to the newly-formed Mountain Ridge Cooperative Parish, consisting of Mount Zion UMC in Sabillasville, MD and Pleasant Walk UMC in Wolfsville, MD, both "hearing" congregations.

A report on The United Methodist Church General Conference 2016 General Commission on Religion and Race

Last month, more than 1000 United Methodists from five continents across the globe, speaking over 20 languages, gathered in Portland, Oregon to attend opening worship and organize the 2016 General Conference. Even more joined online. Vast differences at General Conference were apparent from the very beginning – differences in language, tribe, identity, race, age, gender, ability, and theology.

To be a worldwide Church requires a level of intercultural communication and competency that is demanding and, at times, difficult. Even recognizing differences means that we acknowledge that there is more than one story and more than one cultural reality. We celebrate all the ways in which this happened throughout General Conference and we are clear that there are many places where the church fell short of our theological task.

Legislatively, 13 out of 14 petitions submitted by the General Commission on Religion and Race (GCORR) were considered and passed. The disciplinary mandates of the agency were adapted to re-articulate the agency's mission and ministry. These changes reflect the agency's response to the current global realities of race, tribe, ethnicity, and culture experienced within the worldwide church, particularly at the local church level. Other significant GCORR-submitted legislation considered and affirmed by General Conference included clarifying the responsibilities of annual conference commissions, affirming the use of diverse languages in the U.S., opposition to white privilege, opposition to racial profiling, and opposition to global racism, tribalism, and xenophobia.

Legislation changes polity, but relationships change people. Change is most genuine when we begin with our own awareness. GCORR is committed to building the capacity of The United Methodist Church to be contextually relevant and to reach more people, younger people, and more diverse people as we make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. That requires more than legislation. GCORR is here to partner with you each step of the way. Check out www.gcorr.org for updated resources on intercultural competency, equity, and on having vital conversations. In the coming weeks, GCORR will release study guides featuring key worship moments from General Conference and inviting you to go deeper and explore in small groups what ministry looks like in your local context when you engage across lines of difference.


